
Music Camp

This was the second year that the Rally was in Herkimer and it was immediately evident that the fairgrounds had made improvements since last year's Rally. Improvements included many new electric hookups--lots of 30 amp and quite a few 50 amp (for an additional fee).

The Maestros were led by Sue Siegler (and Flautist extraordinaire). The ensemble was small but well balanced. Trumpets included Ari Siegler and Bruce Taylor; Jim Hamby played the Alto Sax (and Clarinet) and Sandy Martin played Tenor Sax (and Bass Guitar).
